Boltzmann-Gibbs statistics meets infinite ergodic theory

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Fermi pointed out that the Hydrogen atom in a thermal setting is unstable, as the canonical partition function of this simple system diverges. We show how a non-normalised Boltzmann Gibbs measure can still yield statistical averages and thermodynamic properties of physical observables, exploiting a model of Langevin dynamics of a Brownian particle in an asymptotically flat potential [1]. The ergodic theory of such systems is known in mathematics as infinite (non-normalisable) ergodic theory. We will then discuss these issues in the context of 1/f noise, weak chaos, resetting, L'evy walks and a gas of laser cooled atoms [2].
